### COVID Protocols for In-Person Attendance:

The National Center is working with Hunter College and the Roosevelt House Public Policy Institute of Hunter College on safety protocols for in-person conference participation and will continue to monitor recommendations from the CDC and local health officials. All in-person participants at the 2023 Annual Conference, whether a presenter, attendee, staff, guest, or vendor will be required [to be fully vaccinated](#). As part of conference registration for in-person conference participation your contact information will be submitted to Hunter College's Public Safety Office and that office will email you an unique [Cleared4 Access](#) link to submit your vaccination documentation to about (14) days before the event. It is also recommended that you bring your hard-copy vaccination documentation with you and ID to be presented as needed upon registration at the conference.

If you are not vaccinated, you must have proof of a negative PCR Test (not an antigen test) from the past (7) days from the last day of the event.

Regarding wearing masks, [NYC officials](#) suggest using a high-quality mask in all public indoor settings and around crowds at all times during the event except while actively eating/drinking, presenting, or in an outdoor venue where individuals can be physically distant. Masks must cover both the mouth and nose. We ask that participants honor the requests of others to mask up and/or maintain physical distancing.

If public health guidelines prevent the holding of an in-person event in March 2023, the National Center will announce a contingency plan.

Please use care when booking travel and hotel arrangements: the National Center is not responsible for airfare or other travel reimbursements should public health guidelines require cancellation of the in-person conference.
