The 583th meeting of the Hunter College Senate was convened at 3:46 PM in HW room 714. 1 2 3 **Presiding:** Abdul Rad, Vice Chair 4 5 Attendance: The elected members of the Senate with the exception of those marked absent in Appendix I. 6 7 Alternate Senators were formally seated in accordance with the procedures approved by the 8 Senate, and clickers were distributed to them. 9 10 11 Report by the Vice Chair Rad moved to have to agenda amended to allow Professor Eckhard Kuhn-Osius to. 12 Undergraduate present the report on behalf of the committee. 13 **Course of Study** 14 Committee Professor Eckhard Kuhn-Osius reported the following: 15 16 "I do not have the final wording yet for the liberal arts issue. As you recall New York State as of 17 2008 required that a BA degree requires that 90 credits be in LA and for a BS 60 credits have to be 18 LA. The idea for this is to limit degree mills that award degrees to students for technical courses 19 with no broad learning. This is affecting mostly transfer students. To alleviate this issue, we went back and forth on how to fix it, and instead of second-guessing the departments on what courses 20 21 should count as LA we are asking them to submit a formal list of courses that should be 22 designated as "Liberal Arts". The list must be approved by the relevant departmental curriculum 23 committee but does not have to go through the full department or dean's curriculum committee, 24 but can be submitted directly to the Undergraduate Course of Study Committee to streamline the 25 approval and have the courses appear in the June 2016 Chancellor's University Report. In addition 26 to this, we are asking the departments to develop a prefix that will allow students and advisor to 27 know if a course belongs to liberal arts or not. The report is attached as Appendix II. 78 79 80 Report by President Raab said the following: 81 The President: 82 "I just want to brag that Mr. Rad got into a graduate program at Oxford. I just want to say how 83 proud we are of you. I just wanted to thank everyone for your letters and email to the governor and 84 state legislature. It does look like he has pulled back on the 485 million dollar cut to the senior colleges. It was tempered this year in asking for the maintenance of effort which has not been 85 86 funded the past two years and leads to the three percent cuts all campuses took this year. We are still in a holding pattern on if these marginal increases for this year will be funded. We are also 87 uncertain if there will be funding for the current contract negotiations. There were good signs 88 89 earlier in the week and now it is uncertain again. 90 91 Another area that concerns us is the funding for capital projects. The good news is that the 92 Assembly did put money in the CUNY Budget, and a significant portion of it is for our project. 93 The amount reported would get us through another year of construction. The overshadowing 94 CUNY issue is the Medicaid funding that became the focus after the governor pulled back on 95 CUNY funding. We have CUNY folks along with a lobbyist we hired for our project up there and 96 are awaiting more information on the final budget. I wish I had better and more particular news on 97 the budget, but as soon as we know the final details, we will let everyone know. 98 99 Two pieces of good news to share are that we just received a half a million dollar grant from the 100 Mellon Foundation to create a pipeline of a diverse workforce in the cultural arena in the city. It 101 will allow us to build internship opportunities for juniors across the city. I also wanted to thank everyone here involved in bringing back our nutrition program to Hunter. As you may know, the 102 program was included in the programs that were moved to the new CUNY School of Public 103 Health. The state has voted to return it back us. I also wanted to thank everyone who participated 104 in the Major Day; we had almost 300 students talk with faculty about majors, minors, and 105 certificate programs. We are also grateful to Mitch and ICIT as we had a breakthrough to getting 106 better access to faster Wi-Fi and eliminated the ten minute time out, and implemented an 107

automatic connection to it when you are in the range of the campus."

Committee on Academic Freedom

Professor Sarah Chinn, Chair of the Committee on Academic Freedom, read the Revised Mission Statement for the Committee on Academic Freedom.

Revised Mission Statement for the Hunter College Standing Committee on Academic Freedom

Academic freedom extends to all members of the Hunter College community. At its core, it constitutes the freedom to conduct research, teach, speak and publish, subject to the norms and standards of scholarly inquiry, without interference or penalty, wherever the search for truth and understanding may lead. For faculty both individually and in the context of shared governance, it comprises the freedom, based on expertise in the field, to design and implement curriculum and evaluate colleagues within the structures elaborated by the CUNY Bylaws and the Hunter College Senate. For instructors both part-time and full-time, it consists of teaching, evaluation of students, research, creative activity, and publication within their areas of expertise, as well as the freedom to speak extramurally. Academic freedom is of paramount importance in the realms of reappointment, tenure, and promotion. For students, academic freedom consists in the ability to be free in the classroom, laboratory, and other College spaces to express the widest range of viewpoints in accord with the standards of scholarly inquiry.

The charge of the Hunter College Senate Standing Committee on Academic Freedom includes:

- To monitor, examine, and report annually to the Senate on the status of academic freedom at the College;
- To make appropriate recommendations regarding academic freedom policies and practices to the college's governance bodies and, as appropriate, through those bodies to the University Faculty Senate;
- To investigate possible violations of academic freedom. Structurally, investigations into
 academic freedom complaints neither replace nor serve as an alternative to pre-existing
 grievance or appeals procedures, including but not limited to the functions of Ombuds officer,
 departmental appeals, collective bargaining, and complaints handled by the Dean of Diversity
 and Compliance.

When the chair of a department is a candidate for promotion to full professor, all of the chair's duties in the promotion process for all candidates for promotion to full professor shall be assumed by a chair pro tem. This includes having voice and vote on the departmental P&B, the appropriate divisional or school P&B. and the college-wide FP&B when such bodies consider the issue of promotion to full professor. For the purposes of this section, the Ancillary Units (including the Library), shall be regarded as a division, the FP&B Subcommittee on Personnel in Ancillary Units as the divisional P&B, and the chair of the Subcommittee on Personnel in Ancillary Units as the divisional dean. The chair will have neither voice nor vote on any P&B when it considers any aspect of the process for promotion to full professor. The chair pro tem shall be elected at the first departmental meeting after the deadline date announced by the President for receiving nominations and requests for consideration for promotion to full professor. The chair pro tem will be elected by the full time faculty of the department who would ordinarily be eligible to vote for department chair, and will need a majority vote of all such members of the department for election. Hereafter references to the chair will be understood to apply either to the department chair, if that person is not a candidate for promotion to full professor, or to the chair pro tem.
- 3. The departmental committee will be responsible for reviewing the files, scholarship materials, and letters of outside evaluation for all the candidates for promotion to full professor within the department and to make a recommendation as to whether the candidate should be endorsed for promotion.

8. The appropriate divisional or school personnel and budget committee shall review all supporting documents for the candidate's promotion. An interview before this committee may be requested by the candidate or the committee. Refusal to meet with the committee shall not be prejudicial to the candidate. However, the committee shall not refuse to meet with the candidate once such a meeting is requested in writing by the candidate. The committee may ask any member of the faculty to serve as a resource in gathering pertinent information on the candidate's relevant discipline, including members from the candidate's department and/or school or division.

8. The appropriate divisional or school personnel and budget committee shall review all supporting documents for the candidate's promotion. An interview before this committee may be requested by the candidate or the committee. Refusal to meet with the committee shall not be prejudicial to the candidate. Such nominations shall be addressed to the Nominations Committee of the Senate which may make its own nominations as well as soliciting them from the floor of the Senate. Each candidate shall be voted on individually by a for-oragainst vote, the appointment going to the candidate with the highest plurality of for-votes, provided their number exceeds two-thirds of the number of representatives present and voting.

Section 3

The appointment shall be for a term of three years, removal from office to occur only as a result of disability.

Section 4

The Hunter College Ombudsman shall consider complaints and grievances that are brought by any member of the Hunter College community, concerning a condition or problem in the College, may investigate the conditions giving rise to such complaints and may refer cases to others when the usual appeals procedures seem adequate. The Ombudsman will undertake independent investigations, in general, only if the usual procedures have proved inadequate or have been exhausted, and shall be empowered to recommend action to any officer or to any committee or organization of the College. The Ombudsman shall from time to time report on his or her work to the Hunter College Senate; and may otherwise publicize the results of investigations.

Section 5

The Ombudsman-shall be responsible for causing an impartial review to be conducted of the structure and the functioning of the College Senate at the end of two years of operation, with a view to recommending such changes in structure, functions, operations, by-laws and the like as this review of Senate experience may indicate.

Section 1

The College shall establish the office of Hunter College Ombuds <u>Officer</u>, providing a full-time secretary and such assistants as the incumbent may choose to staff the operation.

Section 2

Any member of the College community eligible to serve on the Senate may be nominated or may nominate herself or himself for the position of Hunter College Ombuds Officer. Such nominations shall be addressed to the Nominations Committee of the Senate which may make its own nominations as well as soliciting them from the floor of the Senate. Each candidate shall be voted on individually by a for-oragainst vote, the appointment going to the candidate with the highest plurality of "for" votes, provided their number exceeds two-thirds of the number of representatives present and voting.

Section 3

The appointment shall be for a term of three years, removal from office to occur only as <u>the</u> result of <u>demonstrated inability to perform the duties of the office</u>.

Section 4

The Hunter College Ombuds <u>Officer</u> shall consider complaints and grievances that are brought by any member of the Hunter College community, concerning a condition or problem in the College, may investigate the conditions giving rise to such complaints and may refer cases to others when the usual appeals procedures seem adequate. The Ombuds <u>Officer</u> will undertake independent investigations, in general, only if the usual procedures have proved inadequate or have been exhausted, and shall be empowered to recommend action to any officer or to any committee or organization of the College. The Ombuds <u>Officer</u> shall from time to time report on his or her work to the Hunter College Senate; and may otherwise publicize the results of investigations.

Section 5

Creation of Ad-hoc Sub-Committee in Hiring Practices A subcommittee of the Committees on Academic Freedom and Departmental Governance 4 May 2016

Search Committee for Chief Librarian

President Raab has asked the Hunter College Senate to begin the process for the election of a Search Committee for Chief Librarian. In accordance with the "College-wide Search Procedures," nominations for membership on the search committee will be conducted as follows:

A. Nominations for Faculty and Students:
Full-time faculty and students from departments or equivalents who want to be nominated for membership on the Search Committee through departmental election should contact their department chairs promptly. Nominations by petition of 25 signatures of their constituency will be accepted in the Senate Office. (The procedures are outlined below.)

B. Nominations for Chair:

Members of all units of the College may run for the position of non-voting Chairperson for the Search Committee. (See "Procedures" below.) Interested persons should submit their names directly to the Senate Office.

All nominations, including by petition, must be received by the Senate Office no later than 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, May 5. Panels will be elected at the Wednesday, May 11, Senate meeting. Please email senate@hunter.cuny.edu.

Procedures for Searches for College-wide Administrators:

In the case of a search for **Chief Librarian**, the Hunter College Senate shall elect a panel of 10 faculty members and 6 students in such a manner as to achieve the widest possible distribution among the divisions; the panel shall include four members of the Library staff, and at least two faculty members primarily based at the 68th Street Campus, and at least two faculty members not primarily based at the 68th Street Campus (e.g. School of Social Work or Brookdale). From this panel the President shall choose 3 students and 5 faculty members to serve on the Search Committee, subject to the following conditions: (a) two faculty shall be from the Library, (b) at least one of the five faculty shall be from a campus other than the 68th Street Campus.

Nomination and Election of Candidates for Chairperson:

Any member of the Hunter community may submit nominations for Chairperson. The Senate shall elect a panel of 3 from among the Hunter community at-large from which the President shall choose a non-voting chairperson. The Chairperson shall function as the executive officer of the committee, sending out all correspondence, distributing information on candidates, arranging interviews, etc.

RESOLUTION RE HUNTER FOCUS

Be it resolved that students who have fulfilled the Foreign Language portion of the Focus and have only 3 more credits left to complete the Focus shall be automatically waived from taking those last 3 credits. This change to the Hunter Core Requirement shall apply to all students graduating before or during academic years 2015-16 and 2016-17.

Rationale: The Committee on General Education has been asked to reconsider the Hunter Focus. Students come to Hunter with different levels of foreign language proficiency; and the number of credits they are still required to take varies depending on their matriculation status. Native Hunter students are also affected because they often have only 3 credits left for the Focus after they have completed their Foreign Language requirement. Currently, the student must declare a Concentrated Study and take an additional 3 credit course that is a part of a second major, minor, or concentrated study outside of their area of study. The dimension and complexity of the requirement have made it possible for students to have a number of problems, each of which must currently be dealt with on a case-by-case basis.
