# MINUTES <br> Meeting of the Hunter College Senate 30 March 2016 

The $583^{\text {th }}$ meeting of the Hunter College Senate was convened at 3:46 PM in HW room 714.

Alternate Senators were formally seated in accordance with the procedures approved by the Senate, and clickers were distributed to them.

## Report by the Undergraduate Course of Study Committee

Vice Chair Rad moved to have to agenda amended to allow Professor Eckhard Kuhn-Osius to. present the report on behalf of the committee.

Professor Eckhard Kuhn-Osius reported the following:

Administ the
Committee:
"I do not have the final wording yet for the liberal arts issue. As you recall New York State as of 2008 required that a BA degree requires that 90 credits be in LA and for a BS 60 credits have to be LA. The idea for this is to limit degree mills that award degrees to students for technical courses with no broad learning. This is affecting mostly transfer students. To alleviate this issue, we went back and forth on how to fix it, and instead of second-guessing the departments on what courses should count as LA we are asking them to submit a formal list of courses that should be designated as "Liberal Arts". The list must be approved by the relevant departmental curriculum committee but does not have to go through the full department or dean's curriculum committee, but can be submitted directly to the Undergraduate Course of Study Committee to streamline the approval and have the courses appear in the June 2016 Chancellor's University Report. In addition to this, we are asking the departments to develop a prefix that will allow students and advisor to know if a course belongs to liberal arts or not. The final wording will be brought to the Senate in the future as we wait to hear from the departments on this first."

They are current working on institutional learning outcomes, and they also have to undertake a review of current issues on the Hunter Core Requirement."

## Committee Committee on Charter Review: First Reading of Proposed Amendments <br> Report: <br> Professor Thomas DeGloma, Chair of the Committee on Charter Review, presented the report dated 30 March 2016 for the First Reading of the Proposed Amendments to the Charter for a Governance of Hunter College. The report is attached as Appendix II.

Report by President Raab said the following:
The President:
"I just want to brag that Mr. Rad got into a graduate program at Oxford. I just want to say how proud we are of you. I just wanted to thank everyone for your letters and email to the governor and state legislature. It does look like he has pulled back on the 485 million dollar cut to the senior colleges. It was tempered this year in asking for the maintenance of effort which has not been funded the past two years and leads to the three percent cuts all campuses took this year. We are still in a holding pattern on if these marginal increases for this year will be funded. We are also uncertain if there will be funding for the current contract negotiations. There were good signs earlier in the week and now it is uncertain again.

Another area that concerns us is the funding for capital projects. The good news is that the Assembly did put money in the CUNY Budget, and a significant portion of it is for our project. The amount reported would get us through another year of construction. The overshadowing CUNY issue is the Medicaid funding that became the focus after the governor pulled back on CUNY funding. We have CUNY folks along with a lobbyist we hired for our project up there and are awaiting more information on the final budget. I wish I had better and more particular news on the budget, but as soon as we know the final details, we will let everyone know.

Two pieces of good news to share are that we just received a half a million dollar grant from the Mellon Foundation to create a pipeline of a diverse workforce in the cultural arena in the city. It will allow us to build internship opportunities for juniors across the city. I also wanted to thank everyone here involved in bringing back our nutrition program to Hunter. As you may know, the program was included in the programs that were moved to the new CUNY School of Public Health. The state has voted to return it back us. I also wanted to thank everyone who participated in the Major Day; we had almost 300 students talk with faculty about majors, minors, and certificate programs. We are also grateful to Mitch and ICIT as we had a breakthrough to getting better access to faster $\mathrm{Wi}-\mathrm{Fi}$ and eliminated the ten minute time out, and implemented an automatic connection to it when you are in the range of the campus."

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## Committee Committee on Academic Freedom <br> Report: <br> Professor Sarah Chinn, Chair of the Committee on Academic Freedom, read the Revised Mission Statement for the Committee on Academic Freedom. <br> Revised Mission Statement for the Hunter College Standing Committee on Academic Freedom

Academic freedom extends to all members of the Hunter College community. At its core, it constitutes the freedom to conduct research, teach, speak and publish, subject to the norms and standards of scholarly inquiry, without interference or penalty, wherever the search for truth and understanding may lead. For faculty both individually and in the context of shared governance, it comprises the freedom, based on expertise in the field, to design and implement curriculum and evaluate colleagues within the structures elaborated by the CUNY Bylaws and the Hunter College Senate. For instructors both part-time and full-time, it consists of teaching, evaluation of students, research, creative activity, and publication within their areas of expertise, as well as the freedom to speak extramurally. Academic freedom is of paramount importance in the realms of reappointment, tenure, and promotion. For students, academic freedom consists in the ability to be free in the classroom, laboratory, and other College spaces to express the widest range of viewpoints in accord with the standards of scholarly inquiry.

The charge of the Hunter College Senate Standing Committee on Academic Freedom includes:

- To monitor, examine, and report annually to the Senate on the status of academic freedom at the College;
- To make appropriate recommendations regarding academic freedom policies and practices to the college's governance bodies and, as appropriate, through those bodies to the University Faculty Senate;
- To investigate possible violations of academic freedom. Structurally, investigations into academic freedom complaints neither replace nor serve as an alternative to pre-existing grievance or appeals procedures, including but not limited to the functions of Ombuds officer, departmental appeals, collective bargaining, and complaints handled by the Dean of Diversity and Compliance.

Acting Vice President Robert Pignatello said that he was somewhat aware of the incident and will be meeting with the Director of Public Safety to clarify this, as they do not have a say in the reservation of space.

Due to the late hour, it was moved that the meeting be adjourned. The motion carried, and the meeting adjourned at 5:04 PM.

## Creation of Ad-hoc Sub-Committee in Hiring Practices A subcommittee of the Committees on Academic Freedom and Departmental Governance <br> 4 May 2016

Charge of the Committee: The Ad-hoc Committee is hereby created by the Administrative Committee of the Senate in response to the resolution that passed the Senate on 9 March 2016. The Committee will develop a list of questions that will be used in Fall 2016 to survey chairs (or equivalent), and heads of programs and centers about hiring practices, from beginning to end, to determine what is working and what is problematic. The Committee will report back to the Senate with a list of recommendations, if there are any.

Voting Membership of the Ad-hoc committee shall include:

1. 2 faculty from the Departmental Governance Committee
2. 2 faculty from the Committee on Academic Freedom
3. 1 HEO, chosen by the HEO Forum
4. Representative from Legal Affairs
5. Representative from Human Resources
6. Representative At Large to be selected from among student senators

The Ad-hoc Committee is further charged with reporting its findings and recommendations to the Senate no later than Fall 2016.

## Search Committee for Chief Librarian

President Raab has asked the Hunter College Senate to begin the process for the election of a Search Committee for Chief Librarian. In accordance with the "College-wide Search Procedures," nominations for membership on the search committee will be conducted as follows:
A. Nominations for Faculty and Students:

Full-time faculty and students from departments or equivalents who want to be nominated for membership on the Search Committee through departmental election should contact their department chairs promptly. Nominations by petition of 25 signatures of their constituency will be accepted in the Senate Office. (The procedures are outlined below.)
B. Nominations for Chair:

Members of all units of the College may run for the position of non-voting Chairperson for the Search Committee. (See "Procedures" below.) Interested persons should submit their names directly to the Senate Office.

## Procedures for Searches for College-wide Administrators:

In the case of a search for Chief Librarian, the Hunter College Senate shall elect a panel of 10 faculty members and 6 students in such a manner as to achieve the widest possible distribution among the divisions; the panel shall include four members of the Library staff, and at least two faculty members primarily based at the 68th Street Campus, and at least two faculty members not primarily based at the 68th Street Campus (e.g. School of Social Work or Brookdale). From this panel the President shall choose 3 students and 5 faculty members to serve on the Search Committee, subject to the following conditions: (a) two faculty shall be from the Library, (b) at least one of the five faculty shall be from a campus other than the 68th Street Campus.

## Nomination and Election of Candidates for Chairperson:

Any member of the Hunter community may submit nominations for Chairperson. The Senate shall elect a panel of 3 from among the Hunter community at-large from which the President shall choose a nonvoting chairperson. The Chairperson shall function as the executive officer of the committee, sending out all correspondence, distributing information on candidates, arranging interviews, etc.

## RESOLUTION RE HUNTER FOCUS

Be it resolved that students who have fulfilled the Foreign Language portion of the Focus and have only 3 more credits left to complete the Focus shall be automatically waived from taking those last 3 credits. This change to the Hunter Core Requirement shall apply to all students graduating before or during academic years 2015-16 and 2016-17.

Rationale: The Committee on General Education has been asked to reconsider the Hunter Focus. Students come to Hunter with different levels of foreign language proficiency; and the number of credits they are still required to take varies depending on their matriculation status. Native Hunter students are also affected because they often have only 3 credits left for the Focus after they have completed their Foreign Language requirement. Currently, the student must declare a Concentrated Study and take an additional 3 credit course that is a part of a second major, minor, or concentrated study outside of their area of study. The dimension and complexity of the requirement have made it possible for students to have a number of problems, each of which must currently be dealt with on a case-by-case basis.
