	Let me bring you up to date on several things. First, I would like to thank everyone who participated in the Fall Celebration which was concluded over this past weekend, but especially the faculty who participated in the back—to-class sessions despite the fact that we were in near hurricane force winds and rain that particular day, and everyone who had anything to do with the organizational efforts of it. You will be pleased to know that we had over 2,500 individuals at the various events throughout the weekend. I have asked the group that planned this event to come back for a discussion of things that could be changed and improved, and also to propose some dates for next Fall so that we can get the dates generally circulated as early as possible. 	Now let me give you several specific updates. Some of you may know that there was a roof repair fire at Brookdale on the Monday of Columbus Day weekend. We have had a series of meetings since then to try to address the problems and some of the concerns that have been raised. I have spent time, along with Dean Escott and Vice President Gizis, at Brookdale the other evening at a meeting called by the Student Council down there, followed by another open meeting. 	Mr. John Williams has been appointed acting security director. Let me bring you up to date on searches. The urban outreach director search committee is continuing, and I believe they are going to be interviewing eight candidates in the next two weeks or so. They will then recommend finalists to me for that position, and I will be involving them and others when those individuals are brought to campus for final sets of interviews. The security director search continues for permanent placement. I have not heard from that committee since they initially got organized. There was a delay because we had to re-advertise the position. I believe that the conditions have now been met and that the committee is in active deliberations. in the next month or so. The SEEK director search also continues. The provost has been authorized to begin searches for fifteen faculty members, and she has been in touch with various academic deans and the academic departments. These are searches for 1996-1997. If the budget situation were to improve the hope would be that we will be able to authorize additional searches after the first of the year. If the budget situation were to get worse which is always possible, and in my short time here that has tended to be the case rather than getting exceedingly better, we might have to curtail some of those searches. But, hopefully, we will be in a position to expand the number of faculty. In addition to the faculty searches, the vice president for administration is also doing limited recruitment in key areas in terms of facilities and other appointments within the administrative realm.

I am very pleased to announce a change, and to also congratulate Linda Chin on her new title which is Dean of Staff and Faculty Relations and Special Counsel to the President, that takes place December 1st subsequent to Board action at the next Board meeting. I am pleased to announce that, and to congratulate Linda and thank her for all of her help.

Now an item that I had hoped I could mention and no one would be overly concerned about it because it had stayed cool. But we had a bright sunny day today so that I am sure that those of you in the East and West towers may have a few additional questions about the cooling and chilling situation. As has been posted, we have been assured by DASNY that if we turn the chillers and the temporary chiller off so that they could do the necessary work in October, they would be able to have permanent cooling for us by mid April of next year. Therefore, I have made the decision that it was better to be uncomfortable for a short period of time knowing that, hopefully, in April, May, June, and all of next summer we will have permanent cooling, so that we will not have this problem then. Now, that is dependent on DASNY. We are doing everything we can to keep them to their schedule. We will see how successful we are in the months ahead. I apologize for the uncomfortableness, and contrary to what everyone thinks, the 17th floor and especially the president's office does not have separate air conditioning. So, hopefully, that will solve the problem, and we do appreciate everyone's patience. I know it is difficult. While I am not wishing for a cold winter or a cold fall, I hope that the worst is behind us in terms of the heat.

Those are the items that I wanted to cover before getting into the restructuring and reorganizations proposals. I want to pause for a moment and answer any questions anyone might have."
