MINUTES

Meeting of the Hunter College Senate

7 October 1987		
	The 226th meeting of the Hunter College Senate was convened at 4:05 PM in Room W714.	
Presiding:	F. Fulton Ross, Chair	
Attendance:	The elected members of the Senate with the exception of those listed in Appendix I.	
Minutes:	Approval of the Minutes of September 16th was postponed to the next meeting.	
Report by the President:	The following is a summary statement of President Shalala's report to the Senate:	
	President Shalala informed the Senate that the Chancellor had indicated in June that he intends to appoint Tilden LeMelle as Acting President. The President said that she does not expect to leave until after the first stage of the budget process is completed in early December. She is planning to stay on the Hunter College payroll until about December 20th when her vacation time runs out, so that she would be able to do some last minute lobbying on behalf of Hunter should that be necessary. The President said that even though she is leaving like a whirlwind, business at the College will be as usual with the Provost and the Deans making a lot of decisions. She expects everyone to be appropriately ornery in making the usual demands on the administration and in insisting that they stick to the high standards. There should be no vacuum or slowing down the process. President Shalala said that she has been telling everyone all along that the Senate runs the College and that the place could really run without her. She encouraged the Senate to prove that by continuing to make certain that the College bounces along with its current momentum, and not to wait around to see what the new leader will be like. We should be all geared up so that we can break in that person in much the same way that she was. To do that, the College should continue to move along and make decisions and not slow down in any way.	
	Concerning the budget, the President informed the Senate that she had a very good meeting with the State budget people. They were very cordial and she reminded them that she expected some going away presents for the College in her memory. It was a lively and interesting session with the sense that the budget situation next year is going to be about the same as this year, but with an expectation of getting a few additional things.	
	President Shalala concluded her report by informing the Senate that the Board of Education had appointed her to the panel chaired by former CUNY Chancellor Al Bowker, to search for a new schools chancellor. She said that she is unfortunately the only one on the panel with experience in elementary and secondary education, who knows school superintendents in other parts of the country, but that it is a fair panel. Before actively seeking candidates, the panel decided to ask the Board of Education to decide what characteristics they want of the candidate. Without that decision it would be very difficult to do a proper search. The difficulty is not in finding the candidates, but in explaining to them what the strategy of the Board is. Some want a chief executive officer from a corporation who does not necessarily have to know anything about education, and others insist that the person have good qualifications as an educator. Some have suggested that the person to run the New York City schools ought to be an implementor and not a policy	

maker, and some of them have suggested that the Board should make a total policy and hire someone to run with that policy. Needless to Report by the Administrative

say, the quality of the candidate will depend a great deal on what the definition is. President Shalala believes that there is a candidate out there. She has some ideas about very talented people who have already run big urban school systems who would want to come to New York under the proper set of circumstances. Asbestos Watch	98		
Prof. Caravanos presented the following report as distributed, and answered questions from the floor:			
Training:	101		
As of June 1987, 4 Hunter College maintenance personnel have successful-	102		
ly completed the 4-day asbestos abatement training program. This curri-	103		
culum has been approved by New York City's Department of Environmen-	104		
tal Protection and was sponsored by the School of Health Sciences. The	105		
requirements to become a certified asbestos handler include completing	106		
a 4-day course, a comprehensive medical exam, and passing a written examination administered by the city.	107 108		
Prior to this, the College has trained approximately 10 maintenance wor-	109		
kers from the 68th street and Brookdale campuses. However, these wor-	110		
kers have completed only the 2-day operations and maintenance program	111		
and therefore are not part of the in-house asbestos management team. Another 2-3 workers will be trained at the next course on November 9-13.	112 113		
Andre Hurnie, the College Architect, has completed the requirements for	114		
certification as NYC Asbestos Investigator. Mr. Hurnie now conducts the	115		
necessary surveys for renovation projects involving asbestos containing	116		
materials.	117		
Asbestos Abatement Activities:	118		
The Hunter asbestos team has completed approximately 10 small asbestos	119		
abatement projects (i.e., repair of damaged insulation and clean-ups). The	120		
work is being done under the direction of Russ Marino, the College's asbestos control officer.	121 122		
The 11th floor (north building) asbestos abatement project, which was	123		
done by BC&J Company, has been completed. Final clearance for the	124		
area has been achieved and additional renovation work has begun. The	125		
same asbestos contractors have completed additional, originally unscheduled, work in the north building.	126 127		
The west major askertes shotoment project will be on Level C in the	128		
The next major asbestos abatement project will be on Level C in the North Building (sub-basement) where the chiller and other equipment and	129		
pipes will be stripped of asbestos containing insulation.	130		
Incident:	131		
On September 10th, at approximately 2 PM, a hazardous condition in a	132		
former classroom (room 628-9) that is being renovated to a laboratory	133		
was reported to the facilities office. Upon inspection by the asbestos in-	134 135		
vestigator for Hunter College, a badly damaged heating line with asbestos containing insulation was found. However, an earlier inspection of that	136		
room done by facilities personnel at 11 AM did not reveal a damaged pipe.	137		
It is unclear how and when this pipe insulation was damaged. The Hunter	138		
Asbestos team cleaned this area about 7 PM. The classroom is scheduled	139		
for renovation to a laboratory.	140		
Prof. Ross informed the Senate that the Administrative Committee, in accor-	141		
dance with the Senate recommendation of 10 December 1986, has formed a	142		
sub-committee to address the problem of an academically sound College Ca-	143 144		
lendar in terms of contractual holidays, science labs, and the issue of the 13
