88 Whereas it will help veterans transition into civilian life if such training is recognized and credited toward

93 Hunter College accept up to nine credit hours earned through the military educational system as electives
94 counting towards graduation if the underlying courses are deemed of sufficient scope and depth and of
95 subject matter suitable to count towards a liberal arts degree; and that

97 The Senate charge the Undergraduate Course of Study Committee (UCSC) and the Undergraduate
98 Academic Requirements Committee (UARC), in consultation with the Office of Admissions, to design a
99 process for reviewing and vetting lists of courses provided by the American Council on Education, to
100 determine which are deemed suitable for transfer to Hunter as general undergraduate electives. It will be
101 up to individual academic departments to establish any more specific equivalencies if desired; and that

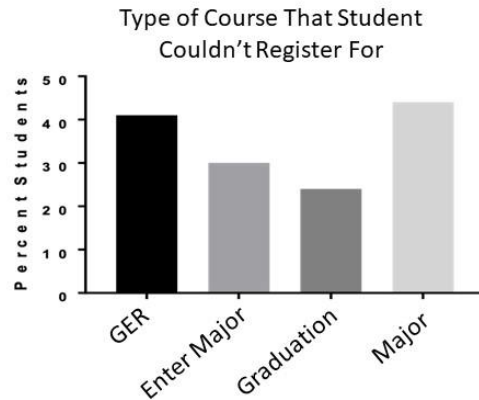

- Class start and end times vary, as do day combinations
- Short overlaps cause scheduling conflicts & gaps for students as well as vacancies.
- Only 63% of current courses are offered on the bell schedule
- Increases scheduling conflicts for students attempting to build a schedule.

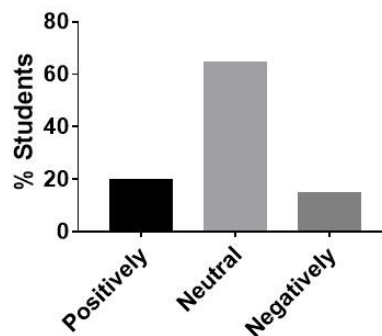
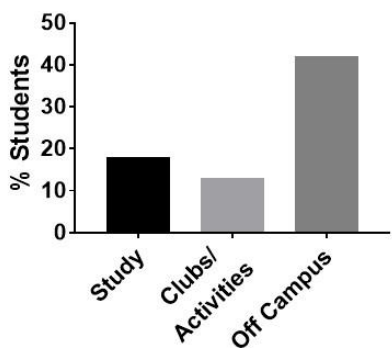
Students Have Problems Registering for Classes Needed to Graduate (2016 Student Experience Survey)

- 22% of problems were due to scheduling conflict



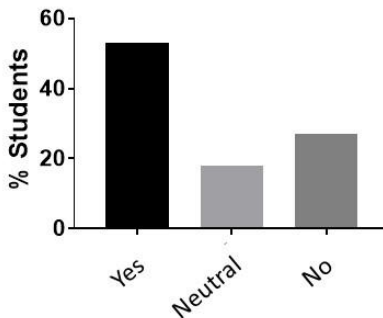
Most Students Don't Use Dean's Hours

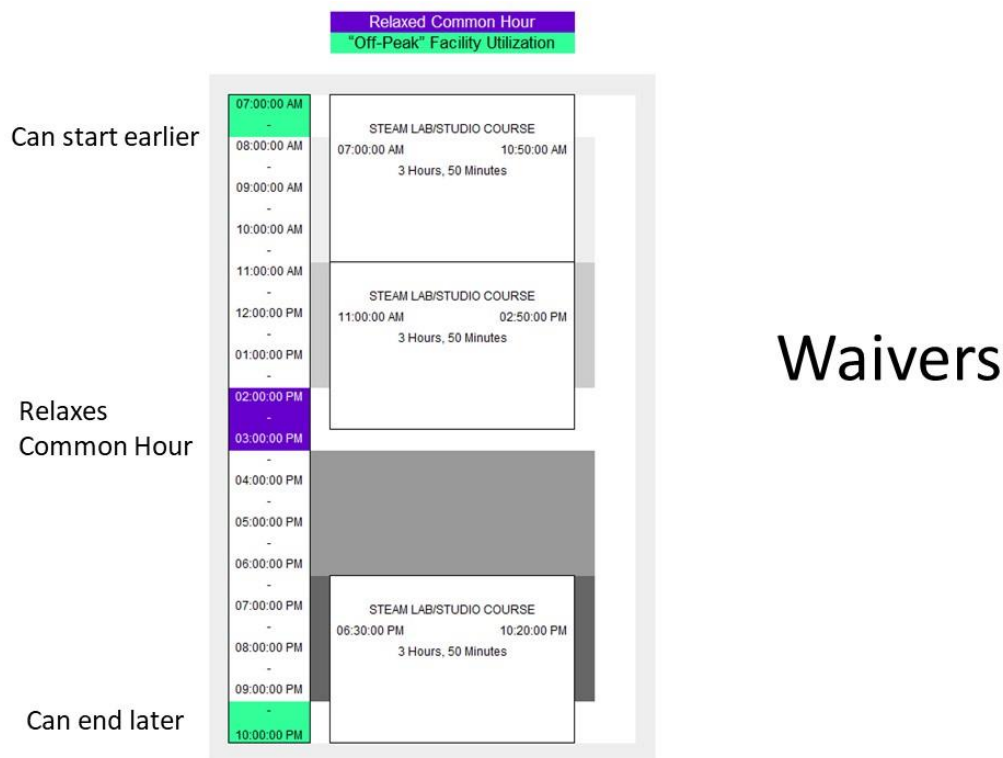

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Would it work? Simulating Our Schedule under the Proposed Bell Schedule

- We adapted the real Fall 19 schedule to the proposed bell schedule under a set of rules in a series of simulations.
- **Main finding:** Our real schedule was readily adapted to the bell schedule proposal in all simulations:
 - >95% of courses fit into the new bell schedule & most courses moved <1 hr.
 - Waivers or room/day changes will address the remaining courses: e.g. graduate courses, professional schools courses, lab/studio courses.
- *Moving to this bell schedule does not “break” our schedule.*

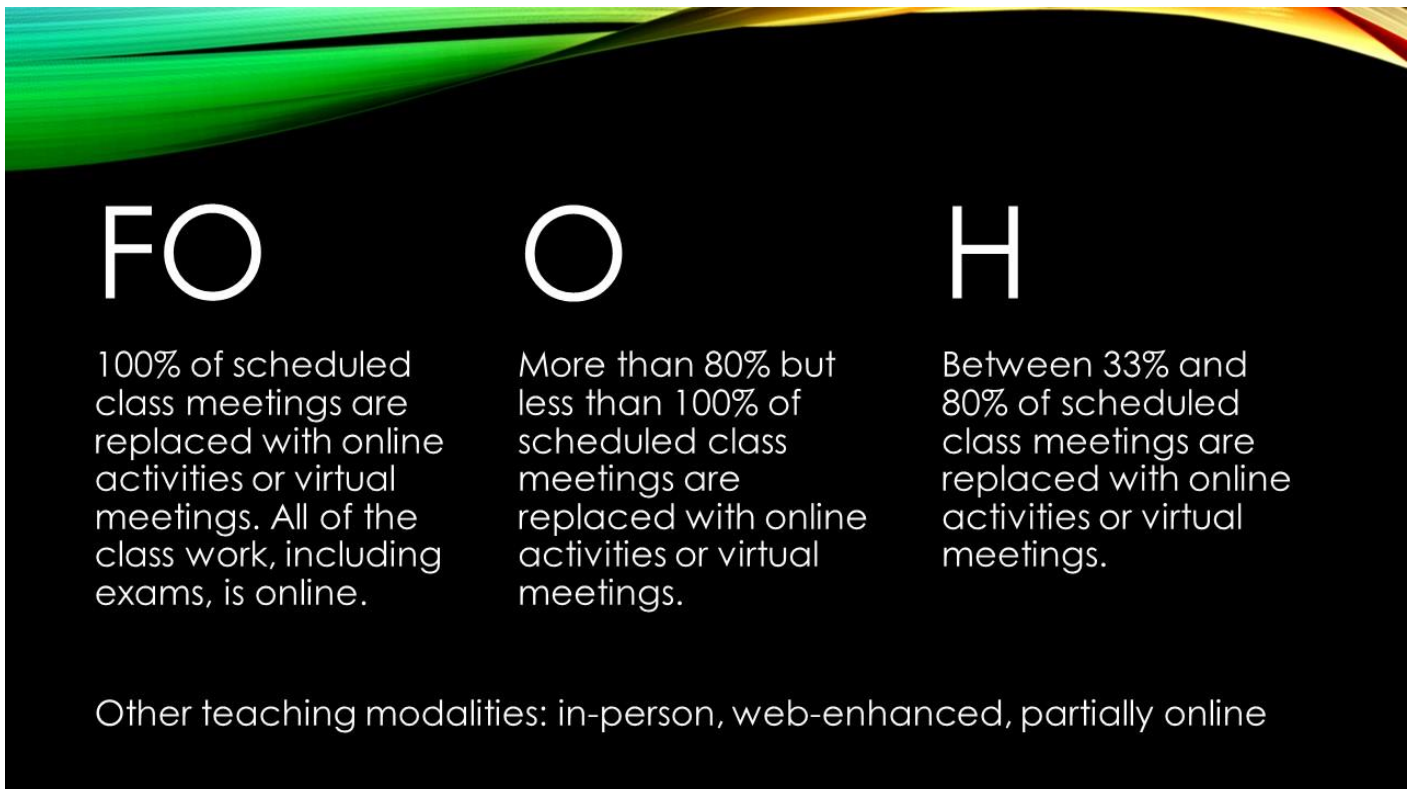

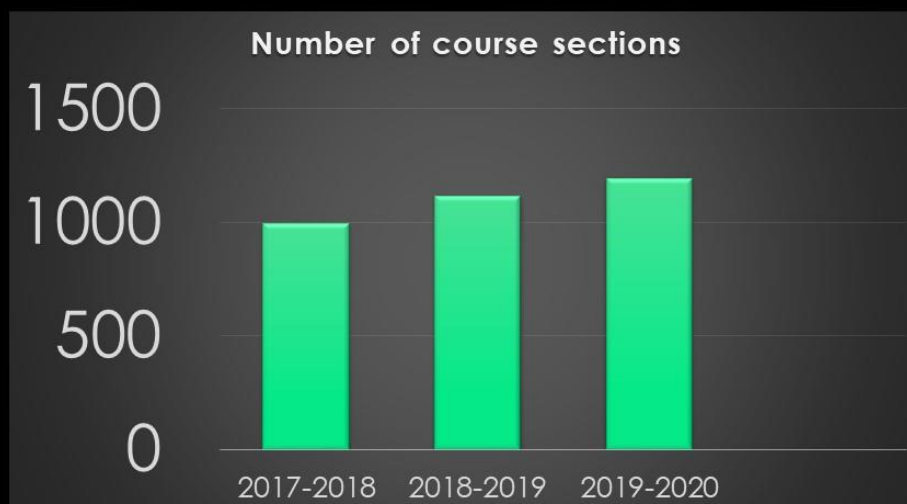
