Old Business: Statement from Committee on the Budget

Professor Randall Filer, Chair of the Committee on the Budget, said the following:

"If you recall just before the end of the first term the Budget Committee reported to the Senate on the cooperation that we have received from the administration on ongoing investigations and the sharing of documents regarding college finances. That report still stands as presented and we have been kept in the loop.

Second I had hoped that we would get good news from the President today on the budget, but there is no final deal in place. From what we have seen there are good signs that funding will be better than it has been in a long time. I want to discuss two items that are serious and may need action. The first is that in the context of the proposed budget there is a tithe tax to be placed on college endowments. In preliminary discussion, we think that this is a terrible idea for a number of reasons. We will be providing a resolution from the committee asking the sense of the Senate to endorse its position that the tithe tax is not in the best interest of the college.

The next problematic issue is the process of Hunter requesting differential tuition which some have raised concerns with. It is allowed to be charged to graduate programs, and it is different from excellence fees, which come to the Budget Committee to be reviewed and reported to the Senate. Over the past 15 years, there has been seven requests for differential tuition for different programs. In 2005, after one such request the Senate adopted a resolution stating that Senate policy requires all requests for differential tuition to go through the Budget Committee and then to the full Senate just like all fee requests. This policy has been honored in the breach and not in the application. It is my belief and understanding that since this time six differential requests have gone to the Board of Trustees and only one has come to the Senate including one which went to the board yesterday. It is not clear that the Senate can require these fees to come to the Senate and it is evident to me that this is more complicated than Excellence Fees. Differential Tuition is an agreement between CUNY institutions who offer the same programs to agree to charge the same and is an extensive process. After a discussion with the Chair and President, we would like to request a clarification of the passed resolution such that differential tuition requests that affect Hunter College only will be subject to Budget Committee and Senate approval. In the case of policies that must be negotiated with other units of the University, the Budget Committee will be briefed to ensure that consultation with affected faculty and students has taken place and will report to the full Senate that policies have been followed but neither body will explicitly approve final tuition amounts."

Chair DeGloma added:

"The 2005 resolution is binding as the Senate passed it. Additionally, the Senate has maintained that it has the right to consult, be consulted and offer opinions on matters regarding tuition and fees. The process as currently laid out in the 2005 resolution on tuition and excellence fees should still be followed. When it comes to Differential Tuition, the Committee on the Budget should be consulted and a report issued to the Senate. In my mind, the Senate is not sacrificing anything in taking this clarified approach. There is currently no need to amend the 2005 resolution as both the Budget Committee and Senate must still be consulted in either case of new excellence fees and/or differential tuition."

VIII.16	The Senate shall establish an Evening Council, consisting of one faculty member from each of the divisions (as defined in Article IV. 1. B. ii) and two faculty members from the divisions serving at-large who teach a course(s) in the evening; one faculty member 7 from the Library; 2 students and 2 student alternates who take a course(s) in the evening; and a Chair elected by the Senate. In addition the Director of Evening Student Services, the Registrar, the Director of Admissions, the Director of Financial Aid, and the Evening Affairs Commissioner of the Undergraduate Student Government, shall serve ex-officio without vote. The Evening Council shall have the following responsibilities: A. To develop and recommend to the President of Hunter College required improvements in the supporting services (library, business office, registrar, etc.) during the evening hours.	The Senate shall establish an Evening Council a Committee on Non-weekday Study, consisting of one faculty member from each of the divisions (as defined in Article IV. 1. B.) and one each from the Schools of Social Work, Nursing, and Health Professions, all of these faculty committee members being chosen, to the extent possible, from among faculty who teach or have recently taught courses that meet in the evenings, on weekends, or in Summer or Winter session; one faculty member from the Library; two students and two student alternates, undergraduate or graduate, who take course(s) in the evening, on weekends, or in Summer or Winter; and a Chair elected by the Senate (see below). In addition the Dean of Students (or designee), the Reg-istrar, the Director of Admissions, the Director of Financial Aid, the president of the Graduate Students' Association, and the Eve-ning Affairs Commissioner of the Undergraduate Student Government, shall serve ex-officio without vote. The chair of the Committee, to be nominated by the Nominating Committee, shall be a full-time faculty member who is either a member of the faculty of one of the professional schools or who teaches graduate courses on a regular basis. The Committee shall have the following responsibilities:					

- B. To provide the Administrative Committee of the College Senate with agenda items of concern to the Evening Council that are not the responsibility of other Senate committees.
 - C. To identify, review, and give focus to matters of interest to the evening students and faculty, with the right to express itself as an advisory body on these matters and to transmit its recommendations to the cognizant authorities.
- A. To develop and recommend to the President of Hunter College required improvements in the supporting services (including but not limited to library, business office, registrar, advising, and food services) to meet the needs of faculty, graduate students, undergraduate, and non-degree students attending in the evening and weekend hours of the Fall and Spring semesters and the evening and daytime hours of winter and summer sessions.
- B. To provide the Administrative Committee of the College Senate with agenda items of concern to the <u>community</u> that are not the responsibility of other Senate commit-tees.
- C. To identify, review, and give focus to matters of interest to the faculty, graduate students, undergraduate, and non-degree students attending in the <u>evening</u> and/or winter or summer sessions, with the right to express itself as an advisory body on these matters and to transmit its recom-mendations to the Senate.
