Report by the President:	Provost Schneewind addressed the Senate in the absence of President Wexler. The following is a synopsis of the Provost's remarks regarding space and classroom problems:	7 8 9
	We are in the process of evacuating the Hunter-Midtown facilities, which have housed, among others, the Math Learning Center, Basic English, D.E.P., and Academic Skills.	10 11 12
	We are at present keeping 466 Lexington Avenue, as we cannot get out of this lease. The lease for Temple Emanuel could be terminated.	13 14
	There is a possibility that the City Department of Real Estate may not renew any leases. This would affect Temple Emanuel, the FBI Building, and 790 Madison Avenue.	15 16 17
	We could absorb a pull-out of Hunter-Midtown and Temple Emanuel if we make a wider ranging use of the rooms here, but do not know where to put the operations of 790 Madison Avenue and the FBI Building should this become necessary.	18 19 20 21
	We have approximately 70 hours per week per room of assignable time for classes if we start at 8 in the morning and continue through 10 o'clock at night. We are using only an average of 38 hours of assignable time.	22 23 24
	We have explored the option of moving the Math Learning Center to 466 Lexington Avenue. There are problems with this option (i.e., expensive electrical wiring which would have to be put in and could not be ready by September as it would have to be approved by the BHE, and plans of eventually moving our of this lease). If the Center is relocated here, it could be done for much less money and would be ready by September.	25 26 27 28 29 30 31
	Scheduling is proceeding. It is hoped that all students and faculty are aware that, if we could utilize our existing classroom space to a much larger degree of its potential schedulable time than is used presently, this would solve some of the classroom problems.
