

# MINUTES

## Meeting of the Hunter College Senate

### 9 November 2016

- 1 The 590<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Hunter College Senate was convened at 3:50 PM in HW room 714.  
2
- 3 **Presiding:** Thomas DeGloma, Chair  
4
- 5 **Attendance:** The elected members of the Senate with the exception of those marked absent in Appendix I.  
6  
7 Alternate Senators were formally seated in accordance with the procedures approved by the Senate,  
8 and clickers were distributed to them.  
9
- 10 **Minutes:** The minutes of September 21<sup>st</sup> were approved as revised. The minutes of October 5<sup>th</sup> were  
11 circulated for review.

- 13 **Report by the**  
14 **Administrative** Professor DeGloma, presented the report as follows:

- 16 **a) Approved Curriculum Changes**  
17 The following curriculum changes as listed in the attached Report dated 9  
18 November 2016 have been approved as per Senate resolution and are submitted for  
19 the Senate's information. Items: US-2090 Geography (Change in Course), US-2091  
20 Human Biology (Change in Degree Program), US-2092 Film & Media (Change in  
21 Course), US-2093 Philosophy (New Courses), US-2095 Political Science (Change in  
22 Minor).

- 24 **b) Special Senate Election for Vacant At-large Seats**

- 33 It was moved that the Secretary be instructed to cast a single ballot in favor of the nominee.

35 The motion passed by voice vote without dissent.  
36
- 37 **c) Resolution to Establish an Ad-hoc Committee on the Governance of Programs and**  
38 **Interdisciplinary Structures**  
39 Professor DeGloma presented the following resolution on behalf of the Administrative  
40 Committee and said the following:  
41  
42 "This resolution is being presented on behalf of the Administrative Committee based on  
43 discussions that have arisen from the Arts & Sciences Bylaws Committee work. Since this is a  
44 new resolution and has not been circulated in advance you are welcome to ask question of  
45 clarification on the content of the resolution. But no formal debate or amendments can be made  
46 until the next meeting on November 30<sup>th</sup>."

54 **Resolution to Establish an Ad-hoc Senate Committee on the Governance of**  
55 **Programs and Interdisciplinary Structures**

56  
57 Be it resolved that the Senate Administrative Committee establish an Ad-hoc Senate  
58 Committee on the Governance of Programs and Interdisciplinary Structures, including  
59 those units officially named Programs, Institutes, Centers, Schools, or any other non-  
60 departmental or interdepartmental entities offering or managing courses of study in any  
61 capacity.

62  
63 Be it further resolved that this Ad-hoc Senate Committee on the Governance of  
64 Programs and Interdisciplinary Structures include the following members (all with  
65 vote): one full-time faculty member from each Division of the School of Arts and  
66 Sciences, one full-time faculty member from the School of Education, one full-time  
67 faculty member from the School of Social Work, one full-time faculty member from  
68 the Division that includes the School of Nursing and Health Professions and Urban  
69 Public Health, one at-large full-time faculty member from the School of Arts and  
70 Sciences, one additional full-time faculty member affiliated with an interdisciplinary  
71 program, two undergraduate students (one of whom shall be from an honors program),  
72 and one graduate student.

73  
74 The committee shall also include the following members who will serve with voice but  
75 without vote: the Chair of the Senate Departmental Governance Committee (or  
76 designee), the Chair of the Undergraduate Course of Study Committee (or designee),  
77 The Provost (or designee), and the Dean of Arts and Sciences (or designee).

78  
79 Be it further resolved that the Senate Nominating Committee will accept nominations  
80 from any current Senator, the list to be shared with the Senate Administrative  
81 Committee who will share the list with the Senate as a whole and any other relevant  
82 bodies. Candidates may also self-nominate.

83  
84 Be it further resolved that the undergraduate committee members can be nominated by  
85 the Undergraduate Student Government in consultation with the Senate Vice-Chair and  
86 the graduate student committee member can be nominated by the Graduate Student  
87 Association.

88  
89 Be it further resolved that the voting members of the committee shall elect a Chair  
90 from among the pool of its full-time faculty members.

91  
92 Be it further resolved that Senate Administrative Committee, in consultation with the  
93 Senate Nominating Committee, draft a committee membership list in compliance with  
94 the representational requirements outlined above, and that the final committee  
95 membership be confirmed by a vote of the full Senate.

96  
97 Be it further resolved that this Ad-hoc Senate Committee on the Governance of  
98 Programs and Interdisciplinary Structures is charged with (A) researching the current  
99 structures and practices pertaining to governance of such units at Hunter College, (B)  
100 consulting and coordinating with any related Presidential or administrative task force  
101 and with relevant administrative offices, (C) consulting and coordinating with all  
102 relevant Senate committees, including the Undergraduate Course of Study Committee,  
103 the Graduate Course of Study and Academic Requirements Committee, and the  
104 Committee on Honors, and (D) reporting to the Senate and making recommendations  
105 for Senate action concerning the following with regard to Programs and  
106 Interdisciplinary Structures: the nature of governance and representation, pathways for

112 curricular development, issues related to coordination between such units and  
113 departments and other offices at the college, and any other issues related to  
114 governance.

115  
116 Be it finally resolved that this Ad-hoc Senate Committee on the Governance of  
117 Programs and Interdisciplinary Structures communicate with the Senate Charter  
118 Review Committee to make recommendations for Senate action when and where those  
119 actions require revision of The Charter for the Governance of Hunter College.

120  
121 Professor DeGloma answered clarification questions from the body and then invited President Raab  
122 to present her report.

125 **Report by the**  
126 **President:**

Below is a summary of President Raab's report:

127 "Thank you Tom, and we do hope that we can find a way to work together on the Interdisciplinary  
128 Programs. As I mentioned at the last meeting, we are looking into the issue with the faculty dining  
129 hall, but are not yet ready to give a presentation on our plans for the space. Vice President  
130 Pignatello is interested in getting faculty feedback on dining services, and we welcome anyone who  
131 is interested in leaving comments.  
132

133 "Now I would like to talk about a rather unfortunate issue. Many of you may have seen the letter or  
134 press that the college has received from the Federal Office of Civil Rights regarding the issue of  
135 Title IX and potential violations. I will turn my time over in a moment to Dean John Rose, but  
136 before I do so I wanted to assure everyone that the college takes deeply seriously the Title IX  
137 protections and investigations that come under this. The press and letter that was issued by OCR  
138 was something that both Dean Rose and myself found of significant concern as we were put in a  
139 position that we had to end the investigation and accept findings that we were not aware of. In this  
140 case, it involved a relationship between a faculty member and student which at the time was  
141 permitted under CUNY policy but has since been changed. We took the matter seriously and the  
142 faculty member in question is no longer with the college. We went through a process, and the result  
143 was a clear response to the complaint, and therefore the student withdrew the complaint, but the  
144 federal government chose to still investigate the case along with other reported Title IX cases from  
145 2011 to 2013. I will now ask Dean Rose to come up and say a few words."  
146

147 Dean John Rose said the following:

148 "Thank you President Raab and I would also like to thank the Senate for the opportunity to address  
149 the OCR findings and resolution. I would like to say how important Title IX is and we embrace our  
150 responsibility to make our values and institutional goals align with Title IX requirements. As  
151 President Raab noted our institution has been at the forefront of our sister CUNY schools in  
152 addressing sexual misconduct issues. We are the first to require mandatory sexual conduct training  
153 for students. We also were the first to promote bystander intervention. We go to residence halls in  
154 the evenings and carry workshops for students. In addition to this we are the founding member of  
155 the Metro Area Title IX Coordinators. This group is a collection of area college Title IX  
156 professionals who meet periodically to discuss title IX issues and related legislation.

166 “Just as CUNY has revised their policies regarding sexual misconduct to be in line with state and  
 167 federal regulations we have responded with increased training and outreach for a wide variety of  
 168 campus community members. Now that I have provided background I will touch on the case that  
 169 led to the report that was issued. The case started as an investigation into a serious allegation of  
 170 sexual misconduct and devolved into one on process and procedures. There was no finding that  
 171 Hunter left students unsafe or unprotected. The findings were on other steps that could have been  
 172 taken with no substance that these steps would have changed the outcome. OCR required that  
 173 campus complete their investigation in 60 to 90 days. They took three years to investigate and  
 174 report their findings and have been unable to respond adequately to the students concerns in these  
 175 cases as they have all graduated and left Hunter College. The cases they looked at and never and  
 176 investigated. They did a follow-up review and looked at our notes and cases files and found no  
 177 investigative causes and raised concerns about non-investigative matters.

178  
 179 “They came to campus and spoke to students directly without our participation in March 2014.  
 180 While here they looked for concerns into our policies and practices and found none. This visit was  
 181 not mentioned in the report that they released.”

184 **Resolution on** **Resolution to Annex Title IX Awareness & Counseling and Wellness Services**  
 185 **Title IX** **Statement to Academic Syllabi Template**

 187 Ms. Joy Nuga, Vice Chair of the Senate, presented the following resolution.  
 188

189 **Resolution to Annex Title IX Awareness & Counseling and Wellness Services**  
 190 **Statement to Academic Syllabi Template**

191  
 192 BE IT RESOLVED, that in addition to the ‘Hunter College Policy on Academic Integrity’  
 193 and ‘ADA Policy’ statements, the Hunter College Academic Syllabi adopt the following  
 194 language:  
 195

196 A. “In compliance with the CUNY Policy on Sexual Misconduct, Hunter College  
 197 explicitly prohibits sexual harassment, gender-based harassment and sexual violence  
 198 (together “sexual misconduct”) against any student, employee or visitor. Students who  
 199 have experienced any form of sexual violence on or off-campus (including CUNY-  
 200 sponsored trips and events) are entitled to the rights outlined in the **Bill of Rights for**  
 201 **Hunter College Students** and are strongly encouraged to immediately report the incident  
 202 by calling 911, contacting NYPD Special Victims Division or their local police precinct,  
 203 or contacting the College’s Public Safety Office (212-772-4444). Students are also  
 204 encouraged to contact the College’s Title IX Campus Coordinator (212-772-4242) and  
 205 seek complimentary services through the Counseling and Wellness Services Office,  
 206 Hunter East 1123.”  
 207

208 Be it further resolved that the aforementioned statement will read under the title of

209  
 210 **“Hunter College Policy on Sexual Misconduct”**  
 211

212 Be it further resolved that the statement will be added to the current Hunter College  
 213 Syllabus Checklist, *Recommendations based on Best Practices*, last updated November  
 214 25, 2009 and all relevant Senate documents.  
 215

216 Be it finally resolved that the aforementioned policy be implemented by Spring 2017.

220 There was a motion to amend the resolution to read as follows:

221  
222 “In compliance with the CUNY Policy on Sexual Misconduct, Hunter College explicitly  
223 prohibits sexual harassment, gender-based harassment and sexual violence (together “sexual  
224 misconduct”) against any student, employee or visitor. Students who have experienced any  
225 form of sexual violence on or off-campus (including CUNY-sponsored trips and events) are  
226 entitled to the rights outlined in the **Bill of Rights for Hunter College Students** and are  
227 strongly encouraged to immediately report the incident by calling 911, contacting NYPD  
228 Special Victims Division **Hotline (646-610-7272)** or their local police precinct, or contacting  
229 the College’s Public Safety Office (**212-772-4444**). Students are also encouraged to contact  
230 the College’s Title IX Campus Coordinator, **Dean John Rose (john.rose@hunter.cuny.edu**  
231 **or 212-650-3262** and seek complimentary services through the Counseling and Wellness  
232 Services Office, Hunter East 1123.”

233  
234 The question was called and carried. The amendment carried by voice vote without dissent.

235  
236 A motion was made to table the resolution until recommendations based on best practices can be  
237 provided.

238  
239 The question was called and carried.

240  
241 The motion failed by voice vote.

242  
243  
244 A motion was made to commit the resolution back to the Administrative Committee to take into  
245 accounts of concerns raised and ring the resolution back at a later date.

246  
247 The question was called and carried.

248  
249 The motion failed by voice vote.

250  
251 The question was called.

252  
253  
254 Voting by clicker provided the following results: 44 in favor, 16 against, and 3 abstentions.

255  
256 Motion to call the question carried.

257  
258 Voting by clicker provided the following results: 51 in favor, 11 against, and 3 abstentions.

259  
260 The resolution was approved as amended.

261  
262  
263 Due to the late hour, it was moved that the meeting be adjourned. The motion carried, and the meeting  
264 adjourned at 5:23 PM.
