# Meeting of the Hunter College Senate 8 February 2017

The 593<sup>nd</sup> meeting of the Hunter College Senate was convened at 3:43 PM in HW room 714. 1 2 3 **Presiding:** Thomas DeGloma, Chair 4 5 Attendance: The elected members of the Senate with the exception of those marked absent in Appendix I. 6 7 Alternate Senators were formally seated in accordance with the procedures approved by the Senate, 8 and clickers were distributed to them. 9 10 Minutes: Minutes of November 9 were postponed to next meeting. The minutes of November 30, and December 7 were distributed at the door. I wanted to start with the issue on everyone's mind: the impact of the 41 recent executive order from President Trump. I want to reassure everyone that Hunter is focused on 42 our community and the potential impact this may have on faculty, staff, and students. We were able to ascertain that three current students could be affected by the order and we reached out to them to 43 44 make sure they were okay and to see if there is any way in which we can support them. We are focused on reaching out and reminding everyone that we are here to help members of our 45 46 immigrant community. We recommend that students with questions or concerns about the 47 executive order or other immigration issues contact Chris Aviles in Student Services and that 48 faculty and staff contact John Rose, Dean for Diversity and Compliance. We will continue to offer 49 assistance through CUNY Citizenship Now, CUNY-CLEAR and other resources. Hunter remains

committed to honoring our diversity and preserving our inclusive community. We firmly believe

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that talent knows no border, and we cherish the contributions and creativity of our immigrant and international students, faculty, and staff."

"On a happier note we have many accolades for students and faculty, and I wanted to share a few with you. Professor of Studio Art Nari Ward is the winner of the 2017 Vilcek Prize in Fine Arts for exploring such complex topics as race, poverty, immigration and the Caribbean diaspora identity. The \$100,000 Vilcek Prize recognizes immigrants to the U.S. who have made outstanding contributions in the creative arts or biomedical sciences. We celebrated Hunter's first Marshall Scholar, Faiza Masood at the end of the semester. Ms. Masood is a child of Pakistani immigrants and one of two recipients from New York State this year. She is a student in the Thomas Hunter Honors Program, majoring in Religion with a double minor in Arabic and Asian American Studies. The Marshall Scholarship will allow her to pursue a Master's degree at the University of London's School of Oriental and African Studies."

"I wanted to touch on the Governor's executive budget. The basic news is good for the system. The budget includes a \$250 increase in undergraduate tuition over five years. Tuition increases are never popular, but this increase, in combination with the funds from CUNY savings and from the Governor, will cover operating costs with a gap of only \$20 million. Without the increase, there would be cuts that affect the services we provide to students. I want to remind everyone that we are dedicated to raising scholarship money and other support for students. I encourage you to tell students to see advisors and apply for the opportunity to get funds. We are here to help and support you; please make use of the opportunities."

"Also in the budget was the surprise of the Excelsior Scholarship, which would start to implement free tuition at CUNY and SUNY institutions. We are still waiting for more details and to see whether this will get through the legislature. The proposal now is for phased-in scholarships that will start for students in a household making \$100,000 or less and will go up to \$125,000. As you know the budget is due to be voted on by April 1<sup>st</sup>. There is opposition from private schools and discussion on how students who receive TAP and PELL will be affected. We will provide everyone with more information when we know more."

"A bit of unfortunate news was that this morning the State Senate denied the Governor's request to cover Dreamers through the TAP Program. This was the first time he included it in the budget, and he has vowed to keep this conversation going. Another interesting and unexpected provision would require all non-profit affiliates of CUNY Colleges to provide ten percent of their annual revenue to the CUNY Board of Trustees to support needy students. What this means is that ten percent of the annual revenue from the Hunter College Foundation, Hunter College Research Foundation, and Auxiliary Corporation would go to CUNY. We estimate that this would be \$35 million dollars to help scholarships throughout the system. We are working to understand how this would work as this money is usually restricted when donated. We do not have much information but are watching developments."

 "On March 14<sup>th</sup> we will hold the official ribbon-cutting ceremony for the 6<sup>th</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> floors of the library. The entire 7<sup>th</sup> Floor will be dedicated to student achievement and will house the Silverstein Student Success Center, which will include our three major tutoring centers. Also, a new preprofessional center will be located on this floor along with the Office of Prestigious Scholarships & Fellowships. The 6<sup>th</sup> floor is the home of the new and long-deserved Frankfort Education Library for the School of Education. Smart classrooms, a new technology help-and-loan center and a lab for

- Ensure that the identities of undocumented members of our community continue to be
- Refuse all voluntary information sharing with ICE (U.S. Department of Homeland Security Immigration and Customs Enforcement) and CBP (U.S. Customs and Border Protection) across all aspects of the University to the fullest extent possible under the law.
- Instruct campus police to refrain from collaborating with ICE for the purposes of immigration
- Commit to providing adequate mental health services for our students, including mental health professionals who have competency in working with politically marginalized communities.
- Increase administrative support to Student Affairs to assist DACA students and other students who lack the protections of citizenship on a strictly confidential basis. This should include counseling DACA students on their educational situations and advertise that such counseling services are available on a strictly confidential basis. It should also include providing for students and other members of the CUNY community immigration-related information and facilitating access to legal counsel. This could be done easily by establishing close working relationships with agencies that do offer such counsel and actively making referrals as needed. Free or low-cost legal support should be made available not just to students with DACA status, but also to undocumented students and to others who are out-of-status or facing different immigration problems.
- Implement campus-wide training in de-escalation intervention techniques including for CUNY campus police.
- Implement a forum for ongoing feedback from students, faculty and staff about campus climate and additional future actions to protect the safety and dignity of the CUNY community.
- 10. Take these measures during the current semester so that DACA students can be assured of institutional support.
